 - Called to order by motion and approved
- Neighborhood 2022 2023 Achievements & Highlights
 - Hiple
 - Received 10k grant for neighborhood signs, which have been installed
 - Prioritized communication
 - Initiated an email newsletter
 - Created social media accounts
 - Planned bi-monthly social meetups
 - Created Block Steward program
 - Warfleigh resident Michael Welling appointed by Governor MSPC
 - Established/re-established relations with key strategic partners
 - Midtown Indy, DPW, & adjacent neighborhood associations
 - Website development
- Guest Speakers
 - District 7 Councilor Barth
 - Redistricting now the district cuts across 63rd street. Everyone north of there will vote for District 2, south of there is District 7.
 - It will be effective in May for the primary
 - Councilor Barth is unopposed at present.
 - 2 Democrats and 2 Republicans will be running for District 7, including Brienne Delaney who is present at the meeting
 - Reckless driving/street racing spiked during the pandemic
 - Barth has worked on the enforcement side, getting overtime budgeting dollars
 - Also has worked with DPW about investing in infrastructure in a way that signals to people to drive appropriately. Passed an update to the Complete Streets Ordinance, which requires that road constructions/improvements need to be thinking of all users of the roads
 - Has been a large budget increase for public safety
 - There has been a large push to invest in mental health treatment

- Now we're testing using multidisciplinary teams that include clinicians leading the team
- o Adam Barnes ED of Holliday Park Foundation
 - The public/private relationship exists with IndyParks to go above and beyond what the parks department can do
 - Governed by a board, with two full-time staff
 - The foundation has raised somewhere over \$15M over 30+ years
 - The events and employment opportunities can be found at https://www.hollidaypark.org/
 - Upcoming:
 - Outdoor classroom will be dedicated to Susan Bayh; slated to break ground in the next month or so
 - Meridian Arch Connector project
 - Original goal of a pedestrian pathway under the Meridian Street bridge is changing because of DPW adding a signal at that intersection
 - Playground renovation has received a grant from the Lilly Foundation that will be used for this. Going through the design process now, budgeting, etc.
 - Ice Rink: went well in its first year, and it'll return this year.
- Brandon Herget DPW Director
 - Priority areas and project updates:
 - 96k potholes fills just this year alone nearly 2k tons of asphalt dropped
 - DPW budget increased for strip patching this year
 - \$1.1B 5-year capital infrastructure plan has been implemented
 - Federal funds; INDOT funds have contributed which will strengthen the local projects
 - Meridian Street from White River north to 96th street set to be completed by December of this year.
 - 64th and Arden Drive will have new signals and signage, with signal upgrades at several intersections going north from there
 - Impact: 1 lane of traffic will be maintained throughout construction.
 - Construction will begin on April 3rd.
 - Broad Ripple Ave construction. Delayed due to finds in utility work. Set to resume the 1st week of April.
 - April 4th is potential date to close traffic, which would put the target for substantial completion by August.

- Westfield over the canal existing bridge will be removed.
 Contractor can only work from February 4, 2024 for 100 days to complete the project.
- IndyGo intends to fulfill commitment to do a traffic study but may wait until after Broad Ripple Avenue reopens for greater accuracy.
- Question about sidewalks: hopefully the capital plan will allow us to budget for sidewalk improvement over the next five years

- After a two-year fundraising campaign the original playground was dedicated in 1992




